

To get from the Bus/Train Station to the Campus:

From the Bus/Train Station, (Number 1) You can walk down Parnell Street, down Wickam Street and turn left onto William Street and pick up a Bus Eireann '308 University' Bus outside the Sports 2000 shop. (Number 3). €1.30 on the Bus Eireann Bus. Alternatively there is a secondary service known as the EuroBus, which departs from the same location and costs €1 and gets you to the campus as well.

Alternatively, there is a taxi rank outside the station and get dropped out to the Campus in Castletroy. Usual cost is around €10-€12 from the City Centre to Castletroy.
